


- Ch. 4-5 displayed the throne room in heaven & the glory of God.
- Ch. 6 is a huge contrast we are brought back to the reality of this present life on earth through the image of the Lamb opening the seals on the scroll.



- Seals 1-4 reveal 4 horses & their riders.
 - White, red, black & pale.
 - There are similarities between John's vision and ZECHARIAH 6.
 - There, the horses and chariots are "...four spirits of heaven, who go out from their station before the Lord..." (v 5).
 - They are sent to accomplish the Lord's will (stir repentance; exercise and execute judgment).
 - They black & white horses went to the "north country," referring to Assyria & Babylon (Jer 1:13-15; 4:6; 6:1, 22; 10:22; Eze 26:7; Zeph 2:13).
 - These nations were destroyed by the time of Zechariah, thus the text says the northern horses had "...given rest to My spirit in the north country" (v 8).

- They were the object of God's wrath, though
 He employed them to punish His own
 people, they went beyond His plan (1:12-15).
- These first 4 seals reveal the condition of the world. For the most part, it is a grim picture in contrast to the throne room scene of the previous chapters.
- **SEAL #1** a white horse.
 - "...He who sat on it had a bow; a crown was given to Him, and He went out conquering and to conquer..."
 - The rider is not identified nor is the cause of his conquering. But the colour white is a hint. Time and again, white is used of Jesus and His people (1:14; 2:17; 3:4-5, 18; 4:4; 6:11; 7:9, 13-14; 14:14; 20:11) purity.
 - A white horse is pictured one other time (19:11-13), "...I saw heaven opened, and behold, a white horse. And He who sat on him was called Faithful and True, and in righteousness He judges and makes war. His eyes were like a flame of fire, and on His head were many crowns. He had a name written that no one knew except Himself. He was clothed with a robe dipped in blood, and

His name is called the Word of God."

- <u>JESUS IS THE CONQUEROR IN 6:2</u>, conquering the hearts of men with the gospel message.
- **SEAL #2** a red horse...
 - "...to take peace from the earth, and that people should kill one another..."
 - There is no reason to think a specific individual is intended by the rider on the red horse, but simply that <u>VIOLENCE REIGNS</u> upon the earth.
 - It was violence in the days of Noah that caused God to destroy the world (Genesis 6:5-6, 11).
 - Violence and unrest are unavoidable consequences of a world that is filled with sin.
 - Though various trials and troubles are part of this world, Christ offers peace.
 - In 14:27, "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid..."
 - Jn 16:33, "These things I have spoken to you, that you may have peace. In the

world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."

- SEAL #3 a black horse...
 - "...a pair of scales ... 'A quart of wheat for a denarius, and three quarts of barley for a denarius..."
 - Life is filled with manifold trials, <u>TROUBLES & DIFFICULTIES</u>. In this 3rd seal, the black horse, John seems to refer to days of famine & hardship. At such times a day's wages only buys a little bit.
 - The scales may be a measuring tool (used in ancient commerce) or representative of justice.
 - Even when circumstances of this life may not seem just, God, who judges in eternity is always just.
- **SEAL #4** a pale horse...
 - "...power was given to them over a fourth of the earth, to kill with sword, with hunger, with death..."
 - Unlike the previous riders, this one is named

 death and Hades accompanied it. There is
 no being, angelic or otherwise known as
 death. "The angel of death" is a misnomer

(Ex 12:12, 23, 29).

- In Revelation 6:8, "death" is personified.
- Though death is common to all, this horse and rider represent **NON-PEACEFUL DEATH**.
- A quarter of the earth a sizeable % of the world do not die peacefully in their sleep at a ripe old age.

How long, O Lord, holy and true, until You judge and avenge our blood on those who dwell on the earth? (REVELATION 6:10) SEAL#5 ...slain for the word of God and for the testimony which they held.

- In the remainder of ch. 6, we have 2 perspectives of the final judgment.
 - The saints who had been slain (who look forward to His coming), and
 - The wicked (who will be in terror when the Lord returns).
- In addition to being subject to all the troubles which are upon the earth (seals 2-4), Christians are also persecuted for their faith (<u>SEAL #5</u>).
 - The Bible and other historical records (Tacitus, Josephus, etc) speak of many Christians being put to death at the hand of the Romans.
 - This is not something that is limited to antiquity; there are areas today where there is great opposition to the gospel & Christianity.

- These murdered saints wondered <u>HOW</u>
 LONG?
 - How long before God would judge the wicked and avenge the blood on those who had persecuted them.
 - Those who remain on the earth may wonder the same thing – how long before He comes?
 - It will happen in the Lord's time. Until then, trust that God knows best.
- Until the time of His coming, the slain saints are given robes of white (purity).
 - More would die for their faith...
 - He would not come until that number is complete (v 11).
 - Inference that number has not been complete.



- Seal #6 verses 12-16
 - When the 6th seal is opened, the judgment has come.
 - The language used is the language of judgment (compare with Isaiah 13:10; Joel 2:10, 31; 3:15; Matthew 24:29; Acts 2:20).
 - This is not a temporal or local judgment it is the final judgment.
 - That being the case, it is obvious the book is not a chronology. It is circular. We will come to the final judgment 5x.
- While the saints anticipate the judgment, the wicked are found hiding, desiring the rocks to fall upon them, rather than face the Lamb of God.



- The question in 6:17 (who is able to stand) is answered in ch. 7.
- The judgment is proclaimed, but restrained (7:1-3). The 4 angels are held back from destroying, until the seal of God's people is confirmed.
 - Later, we find Satan mocking the seal of the Spirit by marking those who are in bondage to him with a mark on their foreheads (Rev 13:16-17; 14:9, 11; 16:2; 19:20).
- There are **4 ATTRIBUTES MENTIONED** about those who are sealed:
 - The number of those who were sealed is given 144,000.
 - The number and the details surrounding it are symbolic.

- There are varying interpretations of the number. A logical approach might be 12 (tribes) x 12 (apostles) x 1000 (perfection).
- All of God's people from both the OT & NT.
- In Revelation 14:4, the gender of those in the image is mentioned.
 - If taken literally, no women would be in heaven!
 - Again, it is part of a figure, not a literal description.
- Also in Rev 14:4, these 144,000 men are described as being virgins.
 - This is not an exclusion of marriage people.
 - It is a picture of purity.
- There are 12 tribes listed.
 - The listing of the tribes is not to limit this to Jews.
 - That would be especially odd, given the book was written to Gentiles.
 - Heaven is not limited to Jews. A tribe is a recognizable image of God's people.
 - This listing of the 12 tribes is unique.

Two tribes that are elsewhere included are excluded here.

- Ephraim and Dan excluded because of idolatry (Bethel & Dan, where Jeroboam set up false worship).
- The image God's people cannot have any part in idolatry. Must be faithful to God.
- In verse 9, we're told about a multitude which could not be numbered from every nation, tribe, people & tongue. Who are these?
 - Some contend it is distinct from the 144,000.
 Which means they limit the 144,000 to something less than all of God's people.
 - The image is the same recall, the number 144,000 was not literal, it is not the number of people included.
 - If you've ever been in a huge crowd, you'll grasp the idea of this "unnumbered crowd."
 - There is a sea of people it's not that counting them is impossible – but at a glance, they are innumerable.
- Four things are mentioned about this crowd:
 - They stand before the throne (in the

- presence of God);
- They are clothed in white robes (made pure by the Lord);
- They have palm branches in hand (tokens of joy & victory; Lev 23:40; Jn 12:13).
- They cry out "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne."
- There is further praise to God by the elders & the living creatures (v 11-12).
 - (1) Blessing, (2) glory, (3) wisdom, (4) thanksgiving, (5) honor, (6) power, (7) might.
- Their identify is addressed (v 13-14).
 - They come out of the great tribulation and wash their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb (14).
 - They went through trials in their service to God and are now rewarded.
 - Some folks get all kinds of kooky about the word "tribulation" in the book of Revelation. It simply means trials.
- The text ends with a parallel to the "...God will wipe away every tear..." text in Rev 21:4 (cf. v 16-17)
